This is a special journey and I promise much fun will be had – I look forward to hosting you as we travel together through these wonderful lands.

'WHEREVER WE HAD BEEN in Russia, in Moscow, in the Ukraine, in Stalingrad, the magical name of Georgia came up constantly. People who had never been there, and who possibly never could go there, spoke of Georgia with a kind of longing and a great admiration. They spoke of Georgians as supermen, as great drinkers, great dancers, great musicians, great workers and lovers. And they spoke of the country in the Caucasus and around the Black Sea as a kind of second heaven. Indeed, we began to believe that most Russians hope that if they live very good and virtuous lives, they will go not to heaven, but to Georgia, when they die. It is a country favored in climate, very rich in soil, and it has its own little ocean. Great service to the state is rewarded by a trip to Georgia.'

Day 1 /2 - Fri 4th Oct /Sat 5th Oct 2024



Day 3 /Sun 6th Oct 2024

Explore Old Tbilisi

Today we'll be sightseeing the capital, with a walk through the old town with visits to Metechi church (12th – 13th Century), the district of the Sulfur bathhouses and Sioni Cathedral – the main church of Tbilisi. Narikhala Fortress has great views overlooking the city, and you will visit the National Museum. Some of the tour will be on foot: the best way to walk through the cobbled streets of the Old Town and along Rustaveli Avenue. There will be some surprise insider experiences along the way ⁽²⁾

Day 4 /Mon 7th Oct 2024

Explore Tbilisi

We set off north from the capital to explore Mtskheta, one of the oldest towns in Georgia, and its religious heart. Located at the confluence of the Aragvi and Mtkvari rivers, Mtskheta was a crossroad of many trade routes from the 3rd Century BC. Jvari Church (6th Century) is a masterpiece of the early medieval period. Visit the Svetitskoveli Cathedral and the Church of St Nino at Samtavro with the tombs of King Mirian and Queen Nana. Lunch in Mtskheta before continuing to a local winery to learn about the ancient art of winemaking in the country. Return to Tbilisi in the late afternoon.

Day 5 /Tues 8th Oct 2024

Tbilisi – Gori – Sioni

This morning we depart Tbilisi for western Georgia heading first to Uplistikhe cave city before transferring onto Gori, the birthplace of Stalin. We'll visit the museum, the house he grew up and his private train carriage before going to see a local ceramicist. We then journey to Sioni for lunch and base ourself at the house in the hills of Nika Vacheishvili. An afternoon to potter in the hills or visit the gorgeous Sioni church nearby. *Transfer time approx. 2hrs*



Day 6/Wed 9th Oct 2024

Sioni – Katskhi pillar – Kutaisi

This morning we depart Sioni after breakfast to start the journey west towards the second biggest city in the country: Kutaisi. We stop at the 40 m limestone monolith known as Katskhi pillar where a working monastery still exists at the top before continuing our journey to Kutaisi. On arrival, settle into our hotel for a two night stay and explore some of the city in the afternoon. *Transfer time approx.* 3.5hrs



Day 7 /Thurs 10th Oct

Kutaisi – Gelati – Motsameta – Tskaltubo - Kutaisi

A relaxed start to the morning before journeying out of the city to the beautiful monasteries of Motsameta and Gelati, founded by David the Builder, King of Georgia from 1089-1125. Return to Kutaisi, and an optional visit to the Soviet spa town of Tskaltubo (25 minutes from Kutaisi), home to an array of crumbling hotels, sanitoriums and bath houses as well as Stalin's favourite spa – an extraordinary place to visit where one section of the building has been kept as is. Lunch before returning to our hotel in the afternoon. *Transfer time approx. 1hr*

Detailed Itinerary

🛗 Day 8 /Fri 11th Oct 2024

Kutaisi – Vani – Borjormi -Vardzia

Today, we check out of Kutaisi and continue our journey south east with a first stop to the impressive little museum of Vani. From 8th – 1st centuries BC, Vani was the religious centre of Kolkheti – the country of the Golden Fleece, many gold artefacts and archaeological findings make this settlement of crucial important for studying antiquity. Our journey continues via the National park of Borjomi for lunch and continues south to the extraordinary cave city of Vardzia where we spend two nights. *Transfer time: 5.5hrs*

Day 9/Sat 12th Oct 2024

Vardzia

A relaxing day off the road today with a visit to the incredible cave monastery site of Vardzia, excavated from the slopes of the Erusheti Mountain on the left bank of the Kura River. The caves stretch along the cliff for some five hundred meters and in up to nineteen tiers and the monastery was an important cultural center, a place of significant literary and artistic work during the 12th century onwards. An afternoon at our leisure enjoying the guesthouse and surround area. *Transfer time approx. 3.5hrs*

Detailed Itinerary

iii Day 10/Sun 13th Oct 2024

Vardzia - Bolnisi

We depart Vardzia today and continue our journey south into the Kvemo Kartli region skirting the vast lake of Paravani and the small town of Tsalka. Bolnisi was settled by 95 German colonist families from Swabia in 1818, whilst part of the Georgia Governorate of the Russian Empire. It's an interesting city with a flourishing wine industry and the wonderful cathedral of Bolnisi Sioni – the oldest Christian structure in the country. We arrive into Bolnisi in the late afternoon for our final night in the country with fine food and wine! *Transfer time approx. 4hrs*

Day 11/Mon 14th Oct 2024

Bolnisi – Tbilisi OR Bolnisi – Sadakhlo – Gyumri (Armenia)


Those who want to, split from the group and transfer back to Tbilisi airport for a flight back to the UK.

Those who continue the journey continue the drive south and cross the border into Armenia with a change in local guide and driver. We visit the monasteries of Haghpat and Sanahin – some of the greatest examples of medieval Armenian architecture, before continuing south to the black stone city of Gyumri for one night.

Transfer time approx. 3hrs

Day 12 /Tues 15th Oct 2024

🛗 Gyumri - Yerevan

This morning we explore some of the fantastic 18th-19th century architecture of the city exploring the lifestyle of the Gyumretsis, and the birthplace of George Ivanovich Gurdjieff. We visit the Museum of the Aslamazyan Sisters, two remarkable and beloved Armenian artists of the Soviet era who broke all the conventions in the visual art world at that time. We continue to the capital Yerevan for a three night stay and an afternoon exploring more of the wonderful galleries here. *Transfer time approx. 2hrs*

Days 13 / Wed 16th Oct 2024

Exploring Yerevan

We start our tour of the city from Republic Square and continue to the Cascade Complex, an open-air museum of modern art providing a fantastic overlook to the entire downtown from above and a glimpse of Ararat. We visit the Matenadaran – a wonderful library/depositary that is home to books, manuscripts, Gospels from long bygone eras of Europe and Asia. There will also be plenty of time to browse the handicraft goods and trinkets at Vernissage flea market.





Day 14 /Thurs 17th Oct 2024

Yerevan - Khor Virap - Echmiatsin - Zvartnots - Yerevan

This morning we journey south from the capital to the monastery of Khor Virap with incredible views looking towards Mt Ararat. We explore Echmiadzin cathedral, regarded as the spiritual centre of the country and visit the Treasury Museum before heading to the ruins of Zvartnots temple en route back to the capital. Visit the eclectic museum of Armenian painter Lusik Aguletsi before our final dinner in the country. *Transfer time approx. 3.5hrs*


